Year 1

Skills Module

Credits: 20

Assessment: 2 x Practical Assessment/ Presentation (Pass/Fail)

A series of practical demonstrations, workshops and projects, carried out in the RWCMD main Campus and Llanishen Studio, introducing the student to the work of members of the Stage management and Technical teams. The module will study basic Stage Management, basic Stagecraft and technical skills including construction techniques, lighting, sound and video systems used in the industry and introduce the relevant Health and Safety matters.

Research and Communication 1

Credits: 20

Assessment: Presentation (Pass/Fail), Written Assessment (Pass/Fail)

A series of classes, seminars, theatre visits and practical group exercises designed to develop the students' research and presentation skills through the study of theatre groups and an analysis of theatrical scripts and characters.

Production Placements A

Credits: 80

Assessment: Practical Assessment on the BA1 Project (Formative Assessment), Production 1 (50%),

Production 2 (50%)

The student undertakes a production project (BA1 Project) in the autumn term and two production placements, one in the spring and one in the summer term. They will work with a team of creative and technical students and staff, attending rehearsals and meetings as necessary in advance of the production week and performance run. The student will further develop their knowledge of Health and Safety.

At the start of each placement, the Student will produce a Personal Objectives Proposal (POP) to reflect on previous work or experience and set new goals. Upon completion of the role, the student will produce a Self-Assessment to evaluate their performance in reference to the POP.

Assessment: Practical Assessment/Presentation (50%) Presentation (50%)

A series of classes, seminars and workshops carried out in the classrooms, studios and theatres focussing upon the financial planning and scheduling for production and planning for an international tour. Advanced knowledge will be attained in Lighting, Sound, Video and Health and Safety processes.

Research and Communication 2

Assessment: Presentation (50%), Essay(50%)

A series of classes and seminars, theatre visits and practical exercises designed to develop the students' study, research, written and presentation skills.

Production Studies

Credits: 10

Assessment: Practical Assessment/Presentation (50%), Presentation (50%)

A series of classes, seminars and projects to develop the students' technical, lighting and sound design and production skills.

Professional Communication

Credits: 10

Assessment: Coursework (Pass/Fail), Essay (50%)

A series of classes, seminars and workshops developing the students' understanding of their intended industry. Specifically, the module will focus upon four main areas; Innovative Practitioners, Theatre Architecture, Industry Institutions and Career Development.

Advanced Research

Credits: 20

Assessment: Dissertation (100%) or Presentation (100%)

A self-generated study of a topic within the scope of the course as agreed with the Module Leader. This study should represent the most significant piece of research undertaken by the student on this course. Tutorial support at regular intervals will monitor progress and provide guidance where required.
